If you come in to the Town Office to <u>have something</u> <u>NOTARIZED</u>, you must sign the paper in front of the <u>Notary Public</u>. <u>DO NOT</u> sign a paper before you get to the Town Office and are standing in front of the notary.



ROADS POSTED

The Maine D.O.T. has posted their roads, so therefore Sorrento's roads are posted as you cannot get onto a Sorrento road without driving over a state road.

REMINDERS!!

There is no parking along the sides of the roads where the snowplows will be plowing - your vehicle can be towed if it is in the way.

Also, remember that there is no plowing the snow from your driveway into the roadway. It is against the law.

The Town's insurance carrier states that the Town must receive from anyone using the Community Building or the Village Green a <u>Certificate of General</u> <u>Liability</u> (as well as Certificate of Liquor Liability, if applicable). This Certificate of General Liability <u>MUST LIST THE TOWN OF SORRENTO AS</u> <u>ADDITIONAL INSURED</u> and must be provided by any one or any group using either the Community Building or the Village Green.

The Fire Department will be toned out by Hancock County Dispatch. There is no number to contact the Fire Department directly – you need to call <u>9-1-1</u>.

MAINE RESIDENTS PROPERTY TAX AND RENT REFUND INFORMATION SHEETS

can be picked in the Town Hall lobby, or you may call and we will mail you one. The sheet tells you how to get online to make out your application or where to call or write for an application to be sent to you.



SALT WATER FISHING

Anyone 16 years of age or older who wishes to fish recreationally in saltwater needs to register in Maine. Customers will be able to register for free at the same time that they purchase their freshwater fishing license.

You should have your freshwater fishing license with you when fishing in saltwater to prove you have registered in Maine.

A person who wishes to fish in saltwater who does not want to purchase a fresh water fishing license must register on the Saltwater Registry. This is done on the regular license form. The state fee is \$0 and the agent/town fee is \$2. A person who wishes to purchase the Salt Water Registry item is required to provide a phone number.

If you are purchasing any other item on the license form, the fee for the salt water registry is \$0 for the state and \$0 for the agent/town.



If you are unsure if you need to apply for a permit, call John Fuhrman, Sorrento's Code Enforcement Officer, 963-2363. Failure to get a permit if needed can result in penalties and other costs.

MAINE SHORELAND ZONING HANDBOOKS

Any Sorrento property owners who own shoreland here in Sorrento may come in to pick up this handbook.

For any differences between this handbook and the Sorrento Shoreland Ordinance, the Sorrento Shoreland Ordinance overrides the handbook.

A copy of the **Sorrento Shoreland Ordinance** can be purchased for **\$5** or you can just look at

a copy in the office if you do not wish to purchase one.

THE 2012 PROPERTY TAXES have been mailed out and were due January 25, 2013. Interest on unpaid 2012 property taxes began on January 26, 2013.

The **liens on the 2010 property taxes** are recorded at the Hancock County Registry of Deeds. Mortgage holders were notified at recording date.

The 2010 property tax liens will be due in May, 2013. Those left unpaid will be foreclosed.

The liens on the **2011 unpaid property taxes** have been recorded in the Hancock County Registry of Deeds and mortgage holders have been notified. These taxes will be due Spring, 2014.



TO NEW LAND OWNERS OR OLD LAND OWNERS – If you have bought or sold a portion of a lot of land, a map of the new division of the properties needs to be sent to the Selectmen/Assessors.

CONCEALED WEAPON PERMITS

As of February 27, 2008, concealed weapon permit renewals and first-time applications now go through the **Maine State Police**, not the Town of Sorrento. If you need a first-time application or a renewal application, please call **624-7210** or go on line to maine.gov.

VITAL RECORDS – As of July 12, 2010 certified records of birth, marriage, & death increased from \$10 to \$15 and marriage licenses increased from \$30 to \$40. The State sets these rates.

AVAILABLE IN THE TOWN OFFICE

4" X 5" orange identification stickers for canoes, kayaks or rowboats. They have $\underline{IF FOUND - CONTACT}$ and space for your name and phone number.



All 2012 **BOAT REGISTRATIONS** expired on December 31. MOST of the 2013 boat registration renewals (those registered after July 1, 2012 will not have renewals sent to this office from Augusta so please bring your 2012 registrations here with you when you come in to do your 2013 renewals) have been received from the State by this office.



If you own a **DOCUMENTED BOAT** there is no yearly registration fee. But there is a **yearly boat excise fee** (for which you are issued a boat excise sticker-similar to a boat registration sticker), payable to the town. This documented boat excise fee is due within 10 days of operation on State waters, or prior to July 1st of each year.

When you come in to pay your boat excise tax, please bring your documentation certificate with you. There will also be a Documented Boat Excise Tax Form for you to fill out. One can be sent to one if you call and let this office know.

MOORINGS AND ROWBOATS

<u>ALL Sorrento waters</u> come under the Sorrento Harbor Ordinance, so all moorings in all Sorrento waters will pay a fee.

Change for <u>mooring inspection</u>: has been changed from every 5 years to <u>EVERY 3 YEARS.</u>

DOGS

**Dogs must be licensed January 1 or when they reach 6 months of age.

If you license your dog(s) <u>after</u> January 31 you will pay a <u>\$25 late fee</u> per dog along with the license fee.

**When licensing your dog, you must bring with you your dog's <u>rabies certificate showing the tag number</u> and <u>date of expiration</u> and your <u>certificate of proof of</u> <u>spay or neuter</u>, unless these are already on file at the Town Office.

**If you lived and paid for your dog's license/tag in another town in Maine and now live in Sorrento, you must come in to the Town Office and exchange for a Sorrento license/tag.

**Any dog living in the Town of Sorrento must have a

Sorrento license/tag. Constraints Spayed/neutered dog fee - \$6.00 Unaltered dog fee - \$11.00 PLEASE INFORM THE TOWN OFFICE IF YOU NO LONGER OWN A DOG. Thank you.

NOTE!!

DOGS: If you have a complaint about a dog(s) being on your property, running loose, barking, etc., you must sign a complaint form. This form states that you may be called to court to testify. Your name can be kept private until court time. If the person involved contacts you, this is witness tampering and can be addressed.

PET CARRIERS – If you have any pet carriers, small or large, that you would like to get rid of, please call the Animal Control Officers.

S.A.F.E. (Sullivan Animal Food Eatery): This is s pet food pantry that is open to residents of Sullivan and surrounding towns, **including Sorrento.** If you are having trouble making ends meet and feeding your pets, contact Kristine at the Sullivan Town Hall, 422-6282. The pet food, both dry and wet, for dogs and cats is available at the Sullivan Town Hall during business hours. Donations are gratefully accepted.

Voucher Program for Spay/Neuter:

Voucher program through the SPCA Animal Shelter if you need help with spaying/neutering your animals. They will pay 1/3, a participating vet will pay 1/3 and you pay 1/3. Please don't hesitate to ask for help. 667-8088

MAINE LAW NOW REQUIRES THAT ALL CATS MUST HAVE RABIES SHOTS.

There is no registration or license or fee as dogs have. But if an Animal Control Officer or other law officer asks to see your cat's rabies certificate for any reason, you must show them the rabies certificate.

CATS: If you have been feeding stray cats, it becomes <u>your</u> responsibility to take care of them, not the town's.



Animals and Cold Weather

Each year, thousands of pets left out in the cold suffer painful effects of frostbite or hypothermia, or even freeze to death. In freezing and sub-freezing conditions, often exacerbated by rain or snow, experts say it is a myth that dogs and cats can fend for themselves, any more than human beings can. Failure to take humane precautions for pets is often punishable by fine or imprisonment. In winter, a little common sense and compassion on the part of pet owners goes a long way.

For starters, the skin on an animal – particularly ears, nose, foot pads, tails and any exposed areas such as the belly – can freeze in as few as 20 minutes in subzero temperatures, and it is not recommended to leave animals outside in temperatures below 40 degrees.

While certain hardy breeds with long, thick coats may fair better in the cold, most breeds cannot adapt to the elements and need sweaters for insulation and limited exposure time. If it's too cold for you to be outside, it's too cold for most domestic animals, and certainly not for hours on end. No matter what the breed, puppies, senior animals, those with arthritis or other frailties, and animals that are typically thin and/or have exhibited significant weight loss for any reason should never be out longer than necessary in winter, per the American Veterinary Association (AVA). According to the SPCA, in cold weather a car's interior acts like a refrigerator or freezer, so leaving an animal in a vehicle is definitely not recommended.

Finally, after a walk or exposure to snow and ice, clear away little ice balls that may collect between your pet's toes and cause painful freezing or frostbite. Toxic ice meting products like rock salt may also collect in paws (pet-safe varieties are available at pet stores), and rinsing and wiping well will prevent ingestion of chemicals that can cause irritation, vomiting and diarrhea when licked.

Signs of exposure in animals:

*Fur stands erect (like goose bumps in humans), signaling decreased body temperature;

*Shivering is triggered to generate heat;

*Shivering becomes violent and animal becomes listless and uncoordinated, with hypothermia probable at this point;

*Collapse and coma ensue, with major organs shutting down;

*If frostbite is present, tissues are bright red, followed by pale color and then black (indicating death of tissue).

What to do:

*Immediately seek veterinary help and use 24-hour emergency facilities if after hours; wrap animal in coat or blankets.

*If veterinary care is not available and the animal is wet, immerse in lukewarm (not warm or hot) bath, gradually increasing temperature of water. Rub vigorously with towels for circulation. Apply warm packs such as hot water bottles to animal's arms if they have less fur, also to chest and abdomen. Warming with a hairdryer on medium heat can also help (wrap animal in blankets as soon as possible), as can a heating pad wrapped in towels (do not expose directly to animal's skin).

From the Sorrento Fire Department <u>FIRE PERMITS</u>

Commercial burn permits

are available November 15 and expire on <u>April 15</u>

You are required by Maine law to have a permit to burn, even for a small pile of grass clippings or leaves. <u>A Forestry Warden will be called if you burn</u> without a permit, possibly resulting in you being summonsed to court and fined.

The person who signs the fire permit is responsible for the fire. Do not leave any fire unattended.

Required for burning:

**at least two adults to attend the burn, **some form of water supply and hand tools must be on hand.

**and it is recommended you have a cellular phone or other communication device to call for assistance should the fire escape.

YOU are responsible to see that the fire is out before leaving.

SHELLFISH ORDINANCE Frenchman Bay Regional Shellfish Conservation

Ordinance

If you would like to harvest shellfish in Sorrento, a commercial or recreational shellfish license is required. The licenses run from July 1 to June 30. "Peck" or recreational licenses may be purchased at the Sorrento Town Hall. A resident recreational license is \$6.00; a non-resident recreational license is \$11.00; 16years and under and 65years and older is only the \$1.00 agent fee. Resident commercial licenses must be purchased at the Ellsworth City Hall. Non-resident commercial licenses are awarded annually by lottery.

A copy of the ordinance may be obtained in the lobby of the Sorrento Town Hall or at Ellsworth City Hall.

Shellfish warden Mike Hall is routinely patrolling the shoreline. Violators will be prosecuted for noncompliance. Local harvesters will work with DMR and other parties to work on conservation measures.

When used in the context of this new ordinance, the words "shellfish", "clams" and "intertidal shellfish resources" mean **soft shell clams** (Mya arenaria), **quahogs** (Mercenaria mercenaria), **razor clams** (Ensis directus), **hen clams** (Spisula solidissima), **eatern oysters** (Crassostrea virginica) and **European Oysters** (Ostrea edulis).



<u>Starting April 4, 2013</u> you will once again need to put your trash bags (each with a trash sticker) in trash cans for pick up, as per our Sorrento ordinance.

Get your trash out early!

Each trash bag must have a Sorrento trash sticker on itbags without stickers will not be picked up. Put the bags in trash cans (other than as stated above for winter). Per our contract with Harris Disposal, the trash bags are **not to exceed 40 pounds in weight when full.**

If something -a bird, animal, whatever - gets into your trash bags and scatters your trash, <u>you</u> are responsible for the cleanup - not Harris.

<u>PLEASE NOTE-If a Thursday is a holiday, Harris will</u> <u>do the trash pick up on Friday.</u>

> **COASTAL RECYCLING** in Hancock - 422-6766 **Making it easier to recycle!**

Hours: Wednesday through Saturday 7AM to 4 PM. There are brochures for Coastal Recycling available in the Town Hall lobby. These explain what they will and will not take.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING PICK UP



The months of **October through June** will have curbside recycling pick up **only the 4th Thursday** of those months.

The months of July through September have pick ups the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Thursdays of those months.

Roadside recycling pick up is done by Tatum Mclean of Gouldsboro. Please call him at <u>266-7908</u> if you have a problem.

Be sure that you have your recycling correctly separated. There are guidelines in the lobby of the Town Office as to how they are to be separated.

Note: The guidelines are the same as the Coastal Recycling guidelines (note: except-roadside recycling does not pick up scrap metal). If not separated correctly, they may not be picked up.

Recyclables must:

- * Be clean and dry
- * Separated into containers by category as shown in the Coastal Recycling handouts in the Town Hall lobby (come in and pick up a handout)
- * Be left out by 7:00 AM

Dates for the next two months are -March 28 and April 25

Have your road-side recycling out <u>EARLY</u>! Have your recycling out at 7:00 a.m.

Set it apart from your trash pick up so there is no mix-up.

Make sure it can be seen.

If you use plastic bags, it is a good idea to use a different color than you use for your trash bags. Clear bags are good.

Roadside recycling does <u>NOT</u> require stickers.

IF YOU ARE IN NEED OF

HEAT ASSISTANCE:

Call <u>211</u> – a 24/7 call center program providing information about programs and services available to Maine people.

LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program) Fuel assistance with oil, kerosene, wood, pellets, propane or electricity.

Home Weatherization & Energy Related Repairs – Programs to fund improvements to make a home more energy efficient and comfortable. These could include home insulation, caulking, weather stripping and furnace repair or replacement.

Eligibility Screening for Other Assistance Programs. Approved LIHEAP applications opens opportunities for other available programs.

Energy Crisis Intervention Program (T.H.A.W. Fund) – is a one time, emergency assistance benefit for ¹/₄ tanks or less or disconnection. This is a low-income, first come, first served basis program funded by donations to WHCA for fuel assistance.

The collected donations have been, and will continue to be, deposited in the bank to help address animal issues and concerns. P.A.W. received its Articles of Incorporation from the State of Maine, so are now recognized non-profit in Maine.

If you know of any animals being left outside too long or without shelter...please call the animal control officer.

P.A.W.S. may also be able to help with your vet bills if you are unable to pay them.

If you need help feeding your pets, you can go to the Sullivan Town Office for pet food. Don't let your pets go hungry or get rid of them because you can't afford to feed them. P.A.W.S. is ready to help. There is dog and cat food and also gerbil and guinea pig food. If you can donate – cat food is needed.

The Sullivan Town Office says – In a note from the Sullivan Town Office –

You <u>MUST</u> pay your auto excise in the town that you live in - before you come to Sullivan or other office to get registration stickers or plates.

When you come to the Sullivan Town Office to complete your vehicle registration, <u>make sure to have your</u> <u>insurance card</u> (it must show date of expiration). They must see your insurance card!

Excise Tax: Excise tax on your vehicle <u>must be paid in</u> <u>the town you live in</u> BEFORE you go to Sullivan or wherever you get your registration.

When registering a vehicle, you must have your insurance card and mileage with you. You must have your INSURANCE <u>CARD</u>, not your insurance bill (this is State law!). If you complete your registration in Sullivan, you can have a copy of your insurance card faxed from your insurance company to the town office at 422-4785.

When you pay your excise to the Town of Sorrento, you will receive 2 copies (a white copy and a yellow copy) of your registration needed to take to Sullivan (or wherever you complete your registration). Please fill out the white copy before coming in to Sullivan. This will save time.

The Sullivan Town Office does not take debit or credit cards.

Also, if you are required to file SR22 insurance you will need to go to Ellsworth to register your vehicle after you pay your excise in your town

Clarification of Letter in Down East Magazine in the February issue
